INTRO TO OBSERVATIONAL ASTRONOMY

Format: Hybrid, In-person, limit - 40; Recorded This course will start out teaching the students how to view the night sky with their naked eyes and to identify the planets, bright stars, constellations and asterisms using star charts and planispheres (a form of adjustable star chart). Next, the students will progress to learning how to use binoculars to observe, craters and other features on the moon. globular clusters, brighter nebulas and some galaxies. Class discussion and nighttime observing sessions will be used to demonstrate how to use a telescope to observe the moon, planets, nebulas, star clusters, galaxies and other celestial objects. These presentations will also include how to select and set up a telescope. The class will finish with an introduction to astrophotography.


